North-South vulnerable, West opens three spades. North holds: S—A 5, H—A 10, D—K Q J 3 2, C—A 8 6 5. What should be bid?

Solution

When one defender has preempted, the chances are that both defensive hands will contain traps for declarer, not just the hand of the preempter. On this deal South did not quite foresee all the dangers.

Kosygin Meets With UN Envoy To Middle East

MOSCOW — Gunnar Jarring the United Nations Middle East peace negotiator, conferred today in Moscow with Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin in his search for peace. The Russians have re-armed the Arab nations since their resounding defeat by Israel in the war a year ago.

Jarring is the Swedish ambassador to Moscow but he has spent most of his time last Summer in the Mideast as a special emissary for Secretary General Thant.

So far he has been unable to get the two sides to the negotiating table and there have been almost daily border incidents between Israeli and Arab forces.

His talks with deputy foreign minister Vasili Kuznetsov and Kosygin took on added significance because of the forthcoming visit to Moscow of Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser. Nasser arrives in Moscow four days after Jarring returns to Stockholm en route to U.N. headquarters in New York.

Southern Baptist Hails 'Open Door'
