OBITUARIES

Widow of Rabbi Mrs. Rubenovitz, 84, Was Hadassah Pioneer

Mrs. Mignon (Levin) Rubenovitz, 84, educator, author and Jewish leader, died yesterday at the Fairlawn Nursing Home in Lexington after a long illness. She was the widow of Rabbi Herman H. Rubenovitz.

Mrs. Rubenovitz, formerly of Longwood Towers, Brookline, was born in Baltimore and graduated from Teachers College of Columbia University, where she majored in psychology and English literature.

Prior to her marriage to Herman H. Rubenovitz, rabbi emeritus of Newton's Temple Mishkan Tefila, she taught at teachers colleges in Baltimore, Md. and Brooklyn, N.Y. Rabbi Rubenovitz died in 1966.

Mrs. Rubenovitz became interested in Hadassah, the women's Zionist organization of America, when her brother, the late Louis Levin, editor and leader in the field of Jewish social service, married a young sister of Henrietta Szold, founder of Hadassah.

Mrs. Rubenovitz was the first president of Hadassah in Baltimore, and served as president of the Boston chapter in its pioneering stages. She also was the first president of the New England Region.

She was a founder of the National Women's League of United Synagogues and had been national vice-president from its inception and founder of the New England Branch.

After coming here following her marriage, Mrs. Ru-

benovitz founded the first circulating library for children at Temple Mishkan Tefila and was founder and curator of the Temple's Jewish Museum, personally procuring items and finding donors for the rare religious articles on display there.

She inaugurated the Hadassah study groups of Greater Boston and lectured extensively on Jewish topics. Mrs. Rubenovitz also wrote and produced numerous plays and published many essays, signatures and sketches dealing with Jewish life and thought.

She was author of "Altars of My Fathers" and "Wine and Bread".

Following her husband's death Mrs. Rubenovitz completed the manuscript of his last work, "The Waking Heart".

Services will be conducted tomorrow at 11 a.m. in Temple Mishkan Tefila, 200 Hammond Pond Parkway, Newton. Interment will be in West Roxbury.

QUINCY — A 56-year-old North Quincy man died yesterday after his automobile ran over him when he started the engine while standing in its path with the hood open.

Francis P. Gill of 71 Elliot av. was apparently attempting to start the starter motor on the engine after his car stalled on Hancock st., police said, and the engine started, which dragged him more than 90 feet.
