Keith J. Bybee is the Paul E. and the Hon. Joanne F. Alper '72 Judiciary Studies Professor of Law and Professor of Political Science at Syracuse University and their Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) Distinguished Lecturer for 2016–2017. He holds tenured appointments in the College of Law and in the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. He also directs the Institute for the Study of the Judiciary, Politics, and the Media (IJPM), a collaborative effort between the College of Law, the Maxwell School, and the S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications. Bybee's areas of research interest are the judicial process, legal theory, political philosophy, LGBT politics, the politics of race and ethnicity, American politics, constitutional law, and the media. His books include *Mistaken Identity: The Supreme Court and the Politics of Minority Representation* (Princeton, 1998; second printing, 2002), Bench Press: *The Collision of Courts, Politics, and the Media*, (Stanford, 2007), and *All Judges Are Political - Except When They Are Not: Acceptable Hypocrisies and the Rule of Law* (Stanford, 2010). His most recent book is *How Civility Works* (Stanford University Press, 2016).
